

REPRESENTATIVE FOR ZONE 1


We had representatives for zone 1 previously, but with the resignations of Jim Shapton and Edward Shiu, we no longer have any representation for this area.

VERGES AND HEDGES TO BE PROUD OF!

We are all very proud to live in such a green area as Curzon Park, but for a number of years there has been a lot of discussion on the maintenance of the Verges and Hedges. Working with our CWaC liaison representative and local councillors, we have now put together the following guidelines for residents.



CWaC guidance:

- No bricks, rocks etc. must be placed on the verges (liability issue)
- If building work damages the verges, then the house owner is responsible for ensuring the verge is repaired appropriately
- It is illegal to drive on the verge (though, paradoxically, for vehicles less than 7.5 tonnes, it's not to illegal to park on them!). If damage is caused by parking on a verge, and witnessed, you can be required to pay for making good the damage.
- If any resident spots poor grass maintenance by the CWaC contractors, please report this to the Council (Streetscene). This can be done quickly and easily by visiting the CWaC website: www.westcheshireyourstreets. co.uk. Alternatively, the SMYLE smartphone App can be downloaded from your App Store and used to report any issues on the go.
- White posts have been installed by CWaC at some locations within the Curzon Park area (for example, at the top of Earlsway near the junction with Curzon Park North).
 These posts have been installed

- because there was damage to the verge and it was likely that this damage would continue to be caused. Further posts may be installed at a householder request (e.g. on Curzon Park South) provided that CWaC is convinced there is already significant damage to the verge and an on-going threat of damage. The householder will be responsible for covering the
- The Council understands that residents take pride in their local areas and therefore generally turns a blind eye to householders who maintain the verge outside their house.
- Residents must not plant shrubs or other plants in the verge outside their house. In some instances, trees can be planted if utility equipment will not be affected but a License must be obtained first.
- There is a possible option of putting up signs about not parking on verges, (as is the case in Lache Park Avenue) but CWaC would have to make a permanent traffic order. Residents would need to have the support of local Ward Councillors and funding would have to be sought by the resident(s) to fund the order and resulting signs.

HEDGES

- For various reasons, some residents allow the hedges and trees on their properties to overhang onto the footpath. This causes a significant problem to some of the more vulnerable footpath users particularly wheelchair users, older people, people pushing pushchairs and children. When an overhanging hedge or tree is reported to the Council and a site inspection reveals there to be a problem with a hedge encroaching onto the footpath, in the first instance a notice will be sent to the appropriate household (outside of the bird nesting season).
- If no action is taken by the householder within 28 days, CWaC will send a second letter. If the householder still does not respond or take action, a notice is sent. If no subsequent action is taken by the householder, CWaC will undertake work to cut the hedge or tree back to the boundary of the property and may recover the costs from the householder.
- CWaC is undertaking a survey in Curzon Park to assess the current situation with regard to overhanging greenery.
- If CWaC assesses there is a problem with a hedge encroaching onto the footpath, in the first instance a notice will be sent to the appropriate household towards the end of August (outside of the bird nesting season).

COMMUNITY **SAFETY Update** from PCSO Fox

DON'T GIVE WORK TO WORKMEN WHO CALL 'DOOR TO DOOR'

I would like to take this

opportunity to remind residents once again not to give work to workmen who call door to door. I am told it is a regular occurrence for workmen to visit householders offering to do roofing, guttering or gardening work cheaply, as they are already working in the area.

Residents are taking an unnecessary risk by employing workmen in this way and my advice is to phone a reputable, recommended firm or individual if you require any work doing.

BE OBSERVANT

I also encourage residents to be observant around your local area and if you notice something you feel is suspicious, call us on 101.

There have been many occasions where a member of the public has phoned us with concerns about suspicious activity and the information we received has been incredibly useful to us in helping us deal with an issue.

On one notable occasion in Westminster Avenue, at the end of last year, a call from a vigilant neighbour resulted in offenders being arrested and charged for a burglary in the area. So - please be alert!

Chester tramways walk

Back in June, quide John Murray took a small group of people on a tour to explore the routes of the old Chester tram network.

The tour started at the top of City Road, where the remnants of the original track that used to lead into the tram shed can still be seen behind the Town Crier. On the other side of what is now Tramways student accommodation, there are more sections, still set in their original cobbles at the entrance to the Tramways building.

One of the tour group commented: "Walking down City Road and along Foregate Street and Eastgate Street, John pointed out some rosettes - cast iron mounting points for supporting the overhead cables. You'd never notice them unless pointed out. John was a very enthusiastic and knowledgeable guide about tram systems in general."

For those who were interested but couldn't make it, stay tuned - he may do the walk again at a later date. In the meantime, there's an interesting leaflet on the CPRA website about the history of the Chester trams.



Pictured above is Car Street, off Station Road, Chester. Car Street leads to the old Bus Depot, that dates back to 1878 and was used in both the horse and tram days. There are still some cobbles and original narrow gauge tram-lines in the middle of the street.
